How a Cancer Patient Can Seek Disability via Social Security

Understand the Two Types of SSA Disability Benefits

- Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI): For people who have worked and paid Social Security taxes. Benefits are based on work history.
- Supplemental Security Income (SSI): For people with limited income and resources, regardless of work history.

Check if Your Cancer Qualifies Under SSA Guidelines

The SSA maintains a "Blue Book" of conditions that qualify for disability. Examples include leukemia, lymphoma, many cancers with metastasis, and lung cancer. Some aggressive or advanced-stage cancers qualify for fast-track approval under the Compassionate Allowances Program.

Gather Required Documentation

- Medical Records: pathology reports, treatment records, imaging results, surgical notes.
- Doctor's Statements: details about diagnosis, treatment, prognosis, and limitations. Work History (for SSDI): W-2s, tax returns, job descriptions.
- Financial Records (for SSI): bank statements, proof of income/assets.
